FIREWORKS

Limited Fireworks Allowed In Aurora Through July 4

Fireworks that do not leave the ground or explode may be discharged and sold in the city of Aurora only between June 15 and July 4 this year.

Three nationally recognized metrics developed by researchers at the University of Colorado measuring vegetation fuel moisture and energy release guided this decision. If you're wondering why Aurora Fire Rescue is lifting fire restrictions at a time when the city has implemented Stage 1 water restrictions due to drought conditions, these decisions are based on different measures.

In light of the ever-present risks associated with fireworks, only use those that are legally allowed, and always exercise caution. Fireworks that explode or that leave the ground are illegal. To file a non-emergency fireworks complaint, visit AuroraGov.org/ContactUs. Call 911 to report life-threatening emergencies.

For more information, go to AuroraGov.org/Fireworks. The city will host the 4th of July Spectacular event with a large fireworks show on July 4 at the Aurora Municipal Center. More information will be available at AuroraGov.org/Events.

Cooking Moment Strawberry Pie

Ingredients:

- 2 cups fresh strawberries, sliced
- ½ cup sugar
- 2 tablespoons cornstarch
- 1 ½ cups water
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 1 (3 ounces) package strawberry flavored gelatin
- 1 baked pie crust
- Frozen whipped topping mix



Mix sugar, cornstarch, salt and water in saucepan. Cook until thickens and clears slightly. Add strawberry gelatin and stir until dissolved. Set aside until thickens slightly. Place layer of gelatin mixture over bottom of pie crust. Place berries on mixture. Pour remaining mixture over, sealing in berries. Refrigerate at least two hours before serving. Put small amount of frozen topping mix on each slice.

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Garden Moment: Lawn Care During A Drought

With our drought and watering restrictions this year, our lawns have taken a beating! Time to consider reducing the lawn size by converting to a water wise landscape. Consider a lawn of native grasses, wildflowers, or native plants. Some rock and mulch beds could enhance the overall look.



WILL A LAWN COME BACK AFTER A DROUGHT?

Yes, brown grass will usually come back, provided the crown and root system remain alive and the grass is only in a dormant state. Completely dead grass will not recover.

Dormant vs. Dead Grass

- **The “Tug Test”:** Grab a handful of the brown grass and pull firmly. If it stays rooted and resists the pull, it is dormant and still alive. If it pulls out easily with the roots detached, it is dead.
- **Recovery Time:** Dormant grass can usually survive for 4 to 6 weeks without water. When rain returns or you begin to water, dormant grass should start greening up within 1 to 2 weeks.
- **Signs of Death:** If the crown has dried out completely, or if you see grayish patches rather than brown/yellow, the grass is likely dead.

REVIVING THE GRASS

If your lawn is dormant rather than dead, you can help it bounce back with proper care:

- **Deep, Infrequent Watering:** Avoid shallow, daily watering. Deeply soak the lawn so moisture reaches deep into the soil. Early morning (between 6 a.m. and 10 a.m.) is the best time to water to reduce evaporation.
- **Adjust Mowing Height:** Set your mower a bit higher. Taller grass fosters deeper roots, which is crucial for surviving dry spells.

- **Hold Off on Fertilizer:** Do not apply high-salt synthetic fertilizers to dormant, dry grass, as it can burn the lawn. Wait until the grass is actively growing and receiving consistent moisture before adding any fertilizer.

If sections of your lawn are genuinely dead, you will need to re-seed or re-sod those bare spots. Early fall or spring – when temperatures are cooler and rain is more frequent – is the ideal time to do this.

HOW TO RECOGNIZE GRUB DAMAGE (JAPANESE BEETLES) IN GRASS

- **Dead Patches:** Irregular brown or dying patches of turfgrass that appear in late summer or early fall.
- **Loose Turf:** Severed roots mean the affected lawn can be pulled up easily, much like a loose rug.
- **Animal Digging:** You may notice skunks, raccoons, or crows tearing up large chunks of your lawn to feed on the juicy grubs beneath.

TREATMENT & CONTROL

- **Target the Larvae:** Apply a grub-control insecticide to the soil during the peak grub feeding months of late summer/fall or early spring. Water the lawn immediately after application to push the chemical into the root zone.
- **Biological Control:** For a natural approach, apply beneficial nematodes (like *Heterorhabditis bacteriophora*) or Milky Spore to the lawn soil.
- **Hand-Pick Adults:** During the summer months, knock adult beetles off shrubs and flowers early in the morning into a bucket of soapy water.

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Pets' Moment

Your Pets and Fireworks

While fireworks are enjoyable by a lot of people, they can be terrifying and overwhelming for pets – and possibly hazardous. On the Fourth of July, many pets become so frightened by the noise and commotion of fireworks that they run from otherwise familiar environments and people, and sadly become lost.

How To Calm Pets During Fireworks:

Walk them during daylight hours to avoid times when fireworks are likely to be set off and to help burn off extra energy.

- Make sure their ID tag is up to date: Stressed pets might look for any opportunity to escape the noise, and having updated identification can ensure they will get home safely if they run away
- Close windows and curtains to muffle the sound of fireworks
- Put on some music or tv to mask the firework sounds
- Create a quiet space where your dog can feel in control
- Create some hiding places around your home
- Pets might look to humans to see how we are reacting and, thus, could be influenced by our behavior, so remain calm during fireworks. Try not to react too strongly to your pets' distress.
