Sprinkler System Maintenance

It may be hard to hear but regular freezing temperatures are right around the corner and now is a good time to prepare your home to ensure everything is running properly. For seasonal checklists, visit AuroraGov.org/ HomeownerResources. • Turn off and blow out automatic and manual sprinkler systems. • Disconnect hoses from outdoor spigots. • Remove leaves from the roof gutters and be sure to point the downspouts away from your home. • Know the location of your water shut-off valve and test it regularly. • Wrap pipes located in unheated areas or near exterior walls of your home or business to protect them. • Flush your water heater twice a year-spring and fall are good times to do this. Check with your tank's manufacturer for instructions on flushing the water heater or call a plumber to do this. • There's still time to install a smart controller for next season. And it makes it easier to blow out your system since your phone becomes a controller remote. Aurora Water offers rebates for smart controllers at AuroraGov.org/WaterRebates.

September is Responsible Pet Ownership Month

 \Box njoying the companionship of a senior dog, the antics of a puppy, and the joy of L playing with your dog is a wonderful thing in life. It can bring us great happiness owning a dog... but while they are providing us those moments of joy, are we giving them everything they need? How can we be the best dog owners we can be? Great things you can do with your dog for responsible pet ownership:

Exercise: Good for us but also for our pets. It could be a long run or just a walk around the block. A tired and stimulated dog is a happy dog.

Healthy Diet: Our dogs need good food to stay healthy. Working with your vet or a pet food nutritionist you can find a food that works best for your dog. Just like people, not all dogs are the same and they can have different needs.

Regular Checkups and Vaccinations: Vaccinations are an easy way to prevent serious illness in your pets. Having regular wellness checks with your pet's vet is very important and should happen at least once a year.

Training: Training doesn't stop and sit down, and come. There are all kinds of training activities you can do with your dog to keep their brain challenged and happy. Basic training is important for all dogs, but there is also more advanced training in canine sports such as: nose work, agility, rally, and more.

Socialization: Proper socialization will make life easier on both you and your pet. If you aren't sure how to properly introduce your dog to new situations or they have problems already meeting new faces, reach out to a professional trainer.

Safety: Keeping your pet safe should be a high priority for any responsible dog owner. This includes (but is not limited to) regularly checking fence lines for possible escape routes, microchipping your pets and making sure the information is kept up to date, keep an updated tag on their collar, and making sure that collars, harnesses, and leads fit appropriately for your dog so they can't escape while out on a walk.

Cooking Moment

Ingredients:

- 20 ounce can pineapple chunks
- 4 cups peeled diced apples
- 2 cups seedless grapes, halved
- $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups broken pecan pieces
- 1 cup diced celery
- **Apple Salad** Dressing
 - ¹/₄ cup butter
 - ¹/₄ sugar
 - 1 tablespoon lemon juice
 - 1 tablespoons cornstarch
 - 1 cup mayonnaise

Directions:

Drain pineapple, reserve the juice and set chunks aside. Combine pineapple juice, butter, sugar, lemon juice and cornstarch and bring to a boil. Chill and stir in mayonnaise. In a large bowl, combine pineapple chunks, apples, grapes, pecans and celery and toss with dressing.

Garden Moment

s we move into Fall, Let's think of how to help our avian friends! This time of year, birds are



starting to migrate. Provide a welcoming environment for them to stop, rest and rejuvenate. Provide a water source, such as bird baths or low bubbling water features. We have a lot of sparrows, wrens and even hummingbirds drinking from our bubbling fountain on the deck.

Provide a food source. Dried flower seed heads, berries and even Juniper berries provide much needed nutrition. Keep your bird feeders full. The birds will help cut down on those pesky mosquitoes also! Eighty percent of migrating birds, including most song birds, travel at night, navigating by the night sky. Because the birds' navigation system is so sensitive, areas of high light pollution can seriously disrupt their proper flight patterns. As a result, the birds become confused, exhausted or lost, depleting their reserve energy. Some of the best ways to reduce the night glow that's so dangerous to migrating wild birds include:

- Making sure lights around our homes and businesses direct their illumination downward, not out or up. We can choose lighting fixtures with shields that focus the light downward, where it's generally needed most.
- Using motion sensors that supply light when necessary, but not continuously. This is also a great way to reduce energy costs.
- Turning unnecessary or decorative outside lighting off by midnight or earlier.
