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Excess Harvest From Your Garden

Excess harvest can be handled in several ways: freezing, canning, drying, donating to food banks or charities, sharing with neighbors, making jams or jellies, or composting any unusable portions.

- **Freezing:** Blanching and freezing vegetables like spinach, kale, and zucchini preserves their nutrients and texture for future use.
- Canning: This allows for long-term storage of items like tomatoes, pickles,

and jams.

- **Drying:** Drying herbs, fruits, and some vegetables (like tomatoes) reduces their size and weight for easy storage.
- **Pickling:** Pickling vegetables in vinegar and spices creates a flavorful and long-lasting preservation method.
- **Fermenting:** Fermenting foods like sauerkraut and kimchi can be a great way to add probiotics to your diet.
- Donating: Food banks and charities are often grateful for fresh produce donations.
- Sharing with neighbors: A simple act of sharing with those around you can build community and reduce waste.
- **Selling:** If you have a surplus, consider selling at a farmers market or through a local co-op.
- Composting: Composting is a great way to recycle any overripe, bruised, or unusable parts of the harvest back into the garden, creating nutrient-rich soil for next year.
- Creating a "harvest restaurant": Host a dinner party featuring your excess produce.
- **Donating to local nursing homes:** Some nursing homes appreciate fresh produce for their residents.

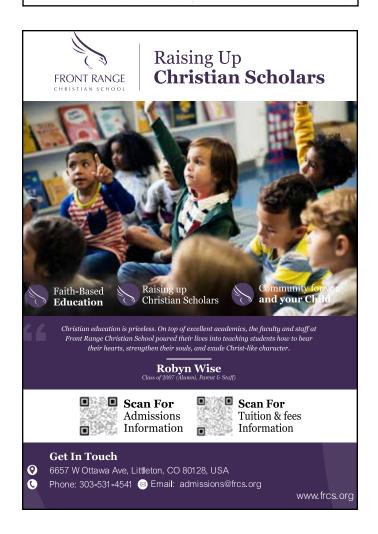

Chipotle Chicken And Corn Chowder _

INGREDIENTS

- 1 can chipotle chiles in adobo sauce
- 2 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 1 poblano pepper, seeded and finely chopped
- 1 red bell pepper, seeded and finely chopped
- 1 teaspoon ground cumin
- ½ teaspoon dried oregano
- ½ teaspoon dried thyme
- 6 cloves garlic, minced
- 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 3 cups whole milk
- 2 cups chicken stock
- 6 small red potatoes, peeled and diced small
- 4 ounces Monterey Jack cheese, shredded (about 1 cup)
- 4 ounces Cheddar cheese, shredded (about 1 cup)
- 2 cups diced cooked chicken
- 30 ounces canned sweet corn, drained
- 15 ounces canned cream-style corn
- 1 cup crushed tortilla chips
- Juice from 1 lime, about 2 tablespoons
- Chopped cilantro, to garnish (optional)

INSTRUCTIONS

Remove one chile from the can of chiles and mince it. Remove 1 teaspoon of the adobo sauce and set it aside to be used later. You can save the remaining chiles and sauce for another use.

Melt the butter in a large Dutch oven or stock pot over medium heat. Add the poblano pepper, red bell pepper, the chile from the can, cumin, thyme and oregano, and sauté for 5 to 7 minutes, or until the peppers become soft. Add the garlic, stir and cook for an additional 30 seconds, or until fragrant.

Stir in the flour with a wooden spoon and cook for 1 minute, or until there is no longer any visible raw flour. Slowly stir in the milk and chicken broth, scraping up any bits from the bottom of the pan as you stir.

Add the potatoes, bring the mixture to a boil, then reduce the heat to low and simmer for 10 to 15 minutes, or until the potatoes are tender and can be easily pierced with a knife.

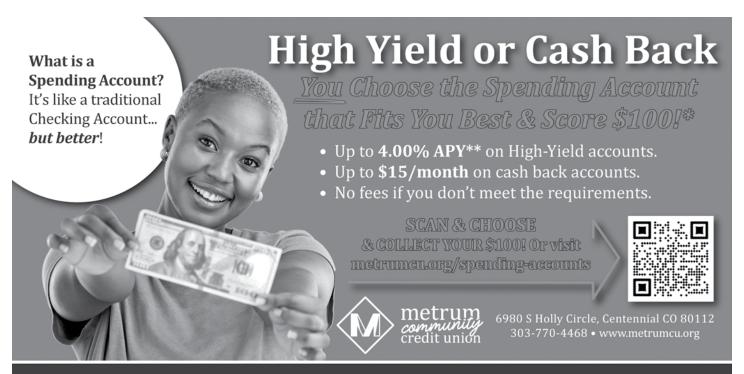
Add the shredded cheeses a handful at a time, stirring after each addition until the cheese is completely melted.

Finally, stir in the chicken, both cans of corn, the tortilla chips, lime juice and the reserved 1 teaspoon of adobo sauce. Cover and cook for an additional 10 minutes, or until the soup is completely heated through. Serve immediately.

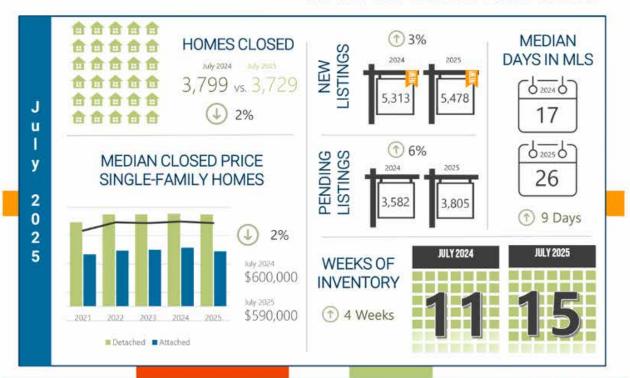
