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### **President's Letter**

I hope everyone is enjoying your summer!

Our work on the Covenant update has been well supported by our community, either through your attendance at a community meeting or through comments. Thanks to everyone who helped us craft a document that mirrors H460 needs. We continue our reviews through July. Your ongoing comments and attendance are much appreciated.

At our June board meeting, we developed the following schedule for completion of the new Covenants document:

- **July:** Complete community review and comments
- August: Work with our attorney, Altitude Law, to add community changes to the current covenant draft and prepare voting documents
- September October: Ballots sent to the H460 Community for voting
- November: Altitude tallies votes, 67% of the H460 Community required for approval

Our current Covenants are quite dated, with many items reflecting com-



munity activity from the early development of H460, rather than what we currently need in today's H460. It is the Board's hope that the community sees this overall need, and that comments from the community, not just the Board, have helped craft a document that is fully supported by H460 homeowners.

# **Covenant Review Committee and Governance**

Thanks to all of you who contact our Covenant Review Committee (CRC) for both questions and requests for approval regarding updates and changes to your homes and property. We try to ensure a quick approval for all the requests that come into the CRC to ensure preliminary schedules remain on schedule.

One of the key areas we see in the summer months is the presence of campers, mobile homes, trailers, and boats, etc, parked in driveways. These items are specifically prohibited in the community. Time for stocking and cleaning activities is limited to 48 hours, but ongoing storage in driveways and the street is not allowed. If you have any of these items, please be aware that current Covenant Article 2, Section 25 specifically prohibits storage of these items, and you are subject to a Covenant Violation Notice if you retain these items on your property.

The CRC continues to work together to ensure that Covenants within the community are followed. Reviews so far this year have been particularly favorable, with very few violations. Homeowners who have received violation notices have resolved issues quickly. So, thanks to the community as a whole, and to those who have received violation notices, for ensuring our neighborhood retains its strong community value.

### Did You Know...

- Independence Day was first celebrated in Philadelphia on July 8, 1776.
- Both Thomas Jefferson and John Adams died on Independence Day, July 4, 1826.
- In 1941, Congress declared July 4 a federal legal holiday.
- The 56 signers of the Declaration of Independence did not sign at the same time, nor did they sign on July 4, 1776. The official event occurred on August 2, 1776, when 50 men signed it. Later that year, five more signed separately, and one added his name in a later year. Thomas McKean was the last to sign in January 1777.
- The origin of Uncle Sam probably began in 1812, when Samuel Wilson was a meat packer who provided meat to the US Army. The meat shipments were stamped with the initials, U.S. Someone joked that the initials stood for "Uncle Sam." This joke eventually led to the idea of Uncle Sam symbolizing the United States government.
- Benjamin Franklin, John Adams, and Thomas Jefferson served on the committee that picked the eagle for the national seal. Benjamin Franklin wanted the turkey!

As many history buffs know, there's some irony to rise of the phrase "Fourth of July" since the date itself has little significance. Congress approved a declaration of independence on July 2, 1776, and John Adams expected that to be the most important date in American history. The official Declaration, however, was approved two days later by a committee. The first printed copies read "In Congress, July 4, 1776." Since that broadsheet was tacked up in cities all over the nation, the date stuck.

### Colorado Caves To Explore

Cave of the Winds: Named for the cool breezes that emanates from the cave's entrance, Cave of the Winds in Manitou Springs is perhaps one of the most popular and stunning attractions in the Pikes Peak and Colorado Springs area. The cave opened to tourists in 1881, and today you can see 15 massive and brightly lighted rooms within nearly a mile of underground limestone caverns. For those who want a peek into its haunting depths, they'll turn out the lights and you can explore by lantern-light tours (included a haunted option). The cave also offers two thrill rides: a zipline across a canyon to witness the grandeur of the area, and the Terror-Dactyl, which launches riders 200 feet into the canyon at nearly 100 miles per hour. You'll also find attractions like the Bat-A-Pult — a seated zipline ride that soars 1,200 feet round-trip — as well as obstacle courses, climbing walls and gemstone panning.

After a journey into the center of the mountains, consider a stop at nearby Manitou Cliff Dwellings, where Ancestral Puebloan homes are tucked into the side of sheer walls.

Glenwood Caverns Adventure Park: Take an aerial tram to the top of a bluff in Glenwood Springs, where a tour of the stalactite- and stalagmite-rich Glenwood Caverns begins. The caves themselves are actually near the top of the mountain, rather than near the bottom as you might expect and require a ride to the top on a gondola that also offers amazing views of the surrounding Roaring Fork Valley. The cave's wide-open, massive rooms are lined with otherworldly rock formations. If you're feeling like you've got the hang of this caving thing, there are also tours of undeveloped portions of the caverns that include some crawling and squeezing to get

After a tour deep underground, take the high-speed alpine slide to the bottom of the bluff or enjoy one of the rides found at the Glenwood Caverns Adventure Park near the cave's entrance.
