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## **Centennial Zoning Change**(Please Research)

I've been made aware from credible sources of something that will have a huge impact on our neighborhood. The Land Development Code (LDC) is a legal document on neighborhood zoning. The city of Centennial

is trying to change the LDC to adopt Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs).

An ADU is the creation of a secondary, independent residential unit by either expanding the existing house or garage OR building a separate but small house behind the existing house. ADUs allow for the doubling of residences on one property. There are ups and downs to having ADUs. Please do your research and think long-term about how ADUs could impact our neighborhood and its infrastructure and quality of life.

A 75% completed draft is on the city's website. Please check out https://www.centennialco.gov/Government/City-Projects-and-Initiatives/ Housing for details.

Whether you are for or against the rezoning changes to allow ADUs, it's our reasonability, to understand all aspects of it and to express our support or criticism to Centennial. Please visit houseing@vcentennialco. gov and centennial.gov/house for details of the rezoning proposals and on how to express your views. We also have a subject matter expert in one of our neighbors, Pete Cooney. He's glad to share a detailed analysis of ADUs and their impact on our neighborhood as well as his involvement in the community that leads to his breath of knowledge on the topic. 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## **Colorado Gardening Tips For October**

Taken from the CSU Denver Extension Horticulture Website:

#### Lawn:

- Aeration, aeration, aeration!
   ... and fertilize.
- Automated sprinkler systems should be turned off and blown out.

#### **Shrubs and Trees:**

- Fall blooming shrubs should be pruned in the winter, during dormant season.
- Spring-blooming shrubs should not be pruned until after spring flowering.
- If leaf spot is spotted, don't use those leaves as mulch, as that could spread the fungus.
- Young trees planted in the past couple of years should be wrapped from the base to the first or second branch to help prevent sun scald.

#### Perennials:

- Plants may be deadheaded and cut back. Best to leave some foliage to protect spring growth though.
- See heads may be left alone.
- Non-hardy bulbs like dahlias and gladiolas should be dug up and stored in a cool, dark place. Hardy bulbs can stay in the ground.

## **Time Traveling Through Food**

This recipe is a nice balance between sweet and sour and is fun for the full family, as it relies on the age-old tradition of pulling taffy. This receipt is from 1896 and is Fannie Farmer's, the mother of the American recipe.

You know how you're supposed to level off a cup of flour with the back of a butter knife? (If you didn't know that you do now.) Fannie came up with that idea and technique. She created cooking classes and cookbooks with standardized measurements. Before that many recipe lists would read something like: "a pinch of sugar and splash of apple vinegar and a dab of salt". Each pinch, splash, dab, etc. is different for each one of us and can create a wide variety of results in whatever is being baked or cooked. Fannie focused on the science part of cooking, looking at the chemical makeup of ingredients and understanding precision was required to have consistence results. It seems obvious to our modern eyes, but it wasn't so back then.

#### Vinegar Candy

- 2 cups (400g) superfine sugar
- ½ cup (120 ml) apple cider vinegar
- 2 T. (30 g) salted butter (plus more for buttering the pan and pulling the taffy)
- Pinch of Kosher Salt
  - Step 1: Butter a large baking dish and set aside.

**Step 2:** In a saucepan, combine sugar, apple cider vinegar, 2 tablespoons butter, and salt. Mix over medium heat. Stir occasionally until sugar is melted. Stop stirring once mixture comes to a boil. Boil until mixture reaches 250F on a candy thermometer, or when a small amount of syrup dropped in cold water forms a ball.

**Step 3**: Once candy reaches 250F, take off the heat and pour into prepped pan. Let sit for 10 mins or until cool enough to handle. Don't wait too long or it will harden.

**Step 4**: Coat your fingers with butter or spray and start pulling the candle until the clear amber turns white. This can take up to 60 minutes, so do this with a partner and alternate. Once candy is white, twist into a rope and cut bite-size pieces. Wrap in wax paper to avoid sticking.
