

Living With Wildlife

One of the many advantages of living in Aberdeen Village is the large lot sizes, the verdant landscape and the mature tree canopy. Along with this comes the enjoyment of watching the wildlife that thrives in our suburban environment. Speaking personally, during four years of living on South Aberdeen

Street, we have been visited by a wide variety of bird species, from songbirds to owls, hawks and even a bald eagle. A mother bobcat and her kits took up a three-day residency in our side yard; and we've seen coyotes, skunks, racoons, and of course the ever-present squirrels and rabbits! Just this week we watched a beautiful red fox chasing a rabbit around our backyard before exiting through a hole under the fence.

An environment filled with animals can generate questions. How do we coexist with wildlife in an environment we have changed by our very presence? How do we strike continued on page 2

Living With Wildlife, continued from front a balance between respecting the natural world and living a safe and comfortable life? To gain some guidance, I talked with a representative of the Colorado Division of Wildlife. The DOW's mission statement is: "To perpetuate the wildlife resources of the state and to provide people the opportunity to enjoy them." Perhaps their balanced approach could provide some guidance.

As stewards of our small pieces of the big picture, what options do we have? As I walk around Aberdeen Village, I see choices that neighbors have made. Many homeowners have installed "downward directed lighting" that minimizes negative effects that nighttime lighting can have on migratory birds. Others have left patches of last summer's grasses and perennials to provide winter homes for beneficial insects and pollinators. If you see a pet cat outdoors, you might notice that the neighbor "belled" the cat to help safeguard our songbirds.

Of course, not every animal or insect contributes to our enjoyment. It's hard to keep positive thoughts toward the swarms of non-native Japanese beetles that arrive in July and for the racoons who leave their "gifts" on the back of my lot! Excess populations of rabbits and human-fed squirrels can pose health hazards, as well as damaging trees and landscaping.

Solutions? The internet provides excellent information on supporting the natural environment (one site: https://www.nrdc.org/stories/how-can-i-protect-wildlife-my-community) while maintaining a comfortable and safe lifestyle. As in many things, balance is probably the key – learn what is needed, make your choices, then take action!

Groundhog Day

February 2nd is Groundhog Day, on which the emergence of the groundhog (woodchuck) from its burrow is said to fore-tell the weather for the following six weeks.

Since 1887 an animal in Punxsutawney has been the center of a staged appearance each February 2. In what has become a media event, a groundhog designated Punxsutawney Phil is the center of attention of television weathermen and newspaper photographers. Although promoters of the local festival surrounding Punxsutawney Phil claim that the animals have never been wrong, an examination of the records indicates a correlation of less than 40 percent. (Whether a groundhog does or does not emerge is thought to be related to the amount of fat it was able to store before going into hibernation.)
