Fly On The Wall Notes from the May 21 Board Meeting

"Hellllpppp!" That was the overriding message from the SP2 Board of Directors to the community during the HOA's latest meeting on Teams. Said Board President Ken Ayars: "I cannot stress enough our need for volunteers in this community."

Volunteers, or even *one* volunteer: The Architectural Control Committee, essential for reviewing requests from homeowners making property improvements, usually operates with five or six members but is down to three, and longtime member Sharon Malion is leaving the committee in December. SP2 documents require a minimum of three volunteers on that committee.

The ACC generally meets one Thursday evening a month, virtually, with occasional email communications in between. It doesn't have to make budgets, write reports or meet deadlines. It reviews requests and makes a concerted effort to keep our rules, regulations and design guidelines up to date. Join Pat Harrington and Karl Schiemann in this critical endeavor by emailing Community Manager Bonnie Bredahl with your interest. If you're not sure, attend the next ACC meeting June 13 online and see what it's all about.

Did you miss the May 21 Board meeting? Here are the highlights:

Look for email notification about an **upcoming mulch meeting**. There is \$40,000 budgeted for mulch, but the Board has not decided whether to dump mulch in the parking lot for pickup, let CDI handle the project, allocate mulch according to the red-blue-green rotation established a few years ago or do something else. Ayars said he'd like resident feedback on that. ... **Tree removal**, with a focus on safety, also is on the docket for this summer. ... **Hopefully the pool** *continued on page 2*



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Sun Stars of SP2 Gardens

Do you have a mulch bed that gets full sun at least five hours daily? Two flowering plants that are great for full sun gardens are Black-Eyed Susans and Salvias. Both are perennial, meaning they return year after year. Black-Eyed Susans will bloom from midsummer to fall, when many other plants are done, so the color is welcome. Dwarf varieties are recommended for our mulch beds because they spread, so give them some room.

Salvias come in many varieties and colors, including annuals. Be sure to get the perennial ones so they will come back yearly. These have the advantage of flowering all summer, if deadheaded. This means removing the spent flower. You can easily pinch off the flower after it's done and more will appear in its place!





Black-Eyed Susans and Salvias are hardy growers, but it's always a good idea to amend the soil. Dig in compost and/or garden soil along with a good watering when planting. They will require watering several times per week until established. After that the occasional drink once a week should be enough.

Impatients are often called shady ladies. They thrive under trees and in gardens that have only partial sun; in full sun, they will wilt. They come in a riot of colors and look best when planted close together, either one color or a mixed palette. They provide instant color to any space, especially after the spring blossoms fade. As these are annuals, meaning only grown for one season, they don't have deep roots and will need more frequent watering, sometimes daily in the heat of summer. They are excellent for pots and planters, and even do well in our mulch beds.

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NOAA Knows Tornado Safety

I was born and raised in western Oklahoma. Tornados were a fact of life it seemed from April through August every year. We practiced tornado drills at school, at home, during baseball and softball games, and even at the swimming pool. Tornados are a natural phenomenon but are also very dangerous. The powerful winds, pressure gradients, and flying debris can destroy property and even lives.

Last year on June 22, when we had a tornado skip across SouthPark2, I was dismayed to find out many friends and neighbors stood watching from their living room window, an upstairs bedroom window, and even from inside the garage with the door raised. My husband and I were in our basement from the first radar images showing intense thunderstorms, high winds, hail, and a Tornado Watch issued until the all-clear was sounded. Just a few weeks later, on July 8, we had another event with a Tornado Watch.



Storms seem to have increased in strength and intensity, so I feel it is important to have some safety reminders as we enter the summer season. Some family members who work for the NOAA National Weather Service in Norman, Oklahoma recommend the information posted at www.weather.gov/safety/ tornado-ww.

Here are some of the basics:

- Tornado Watch: Be Prepared. Have a plan ready to go...There are tornados possible in the Watch area. Be ready to act quickly if a warning is issued. Select an interior room without windows in the lowest part of the building or a basement. If you have recreational helmets, use them. Check batteries in flashlights and a radio as many times cell towers go down and power is interrupted.
- Tornado Warning: Take Action. Warnings are issued by local forecasters. Move to your safe room. A tornado has been sighted and there is imminent danger to life and property. If outdoors, move to a substantial structure and protect yourself from flying debris. Do not go into a low-lying area or a drainage ditch.
- Tornado Emergency: Seek shelter immediately. A tornado emergency is the National Weather Service's highest alert level issued when a violent tornado has been verified. If you see a tornado approaching, do not attempt to outrun it in a vehicle, shelter in place. Once safe be sure to monitor your local forecast for updates.

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Lair 'O The Bear Hike

Lair 'O the Bear, a Jefferson County Open Space, is a good June choice for wildflower viewing. The park has nine trails for hiking and biking with fishing allowed in Bear Creek. Picnic tables and restrooms are located near the parking lot.

Two trails that are considered easy are the Bear Creek Trail to the Castle and the Bear Creek Trail to Bruin Bluff and Creekside trails. The trail to the Castle is an out-and-back trail of

about 2 miles. The Dunafor Castle is located on private land and not accessible from the trail. Despite its appearance of age, the castle was built in 1941 and is now used as an event center. The Bear Creek Trail



can provide a loop hike of 2.6 miles with little elevation gain.

The trail to Panorama Point is more difficult. It is a loop trail 6.4 miles long with an elevation gain of over a thousand feet. The All Trails app provides more information about hiking and biking opportunities in the open space.

The park is located about 20 miles from SouthPark 2 when taking C470 to the Morrison exit (C 74/Bear Creek Rd.). About 5 miles from Morrison there is a large sign for the park just before the entrance to the parking lot on the left.

Colorado Primary Ballots Coming Soon

Colorado's Primary Election is **June 25**. Here are dates SP2 residents need to be well informed and prepared to mark their ballots.

- June 3: This is the last day for voters who are affiliated with a political party to change or withdraw their affiliation if they wish to vote in a different party's primary election on June 25.
- June 6: Colorado Primary Ballots will be mailed. NOTE: Affiliated Voters will receive ONE ballot; Unaffiliated Voters will receive TWO ballots, but can only vote on ONE ballot
- June 17: This is the last day for an individual to submit a voter registration application and still receive a <u>ballot in the mail</u> for the June 25 primary.
- June 17-25: Drop boxes and voter service polling centers must be open. The closest place for SP2 residents to vote in-person is Arapahoe Community College. ACC and the Arapahoe County Administration building at 5334 S. Prince St. have drop boxes.
