Ballot For Covenant Amendment

The ballot for the RV storage Covenant issue is included with this August Tales. If you don't receive a ballot, please send an email to President@HOACanterbury. com or call 720-289-6574. Simply put, a vote in favor of the new amendment will prohibit long term RV, boat, trailer, etc, storage at your residence if it is visible from the street. Approval of this amendment will not affect the current three-day parking rule. A No vote means the covenant will not change.

We encourage every homeowner in Canterbury to vote on this issue. Only one vote per household. Your name, address and signature are required for your ballot to be counted. There are three ways to submit your ballot:

Letters To The Editor And The Residents of Canterbury

I'm writing to kindly ask that you vote "NO" on the upcoming Canterbury HOA Covenant Amendment Ballot.

Our neighborhood is known for being friendly and welcoming – including to families with RVs. Some of the best-kept homes here have RVs, and many of us, including my family, moved here because RVs were allowed. It reflects the outdoor lifestyle we value. A few important points:

- There are about 8 RVs currently parked in the neighborhood, with 5 more homes that could accommodate them—just 3% of Canterbury's 386 homes.
- Around 30 residents recently spoke out against the amendment at a board meeting. Meanwhile, we've seen no clear communication from the Board about how many complaints were received—or whether they came from just a few people.
- That lack of transparency makes it hard to understand the real need for this change.
- It's also unclear how this rule would be enforced. Would fines be issued? Could legal action happen between neighbors?

This amendment could significantly impact the lifestyle of homeowners who bought their properties with RV parking in mind – and could even affect property values for homes with parking pads.

We are a voluntary dues-paying community, and we deserve open, respectful dialogue before altering rules that affect our neighbors' daily lives. Let's focus on community – not conflict.



In anticipation of the Canterbury HOA Covernant Amendment ballot measure, I would encourage homeowners to vote YES. Canterbury is a clean and sought after neighborhood since the values have held up well and appreciated nicely over the years. The measure is geared to restricting RV's and other recreational equipment being allowed to be stored on individual properties. The issue really comes down to aesthetics and neighborhood desirability. I am sure we have all driven through neighborhoods where RVs and trailers with boats and skimobiles are parked on the property for extended periods of time. Aesthetically these items are not helping the curb appeal of the neighborhoods and are unappealing.

If you vote YES to the amendment, it will ban all RVs and other recreational equipment from being stored at the residences where they are visible from the street or adjoining property, especially those that are visible from the street despite being behind a fence. Any of us can search online and see that RVs and other recreational equipment visible to the eye can lower the value of the neighborhood because it does not have the same curb appeal of neighborhoods that lack the recreational vehicles present on the property. It may be appealing to those that own RVs and recreational equipment but that represents a minority of home buyers. When the time comes to sell your house, it does not help when the buyer sees a massive RV or boat out the back door. At best, it detracts from the salability of the property.

The amendment will establish the opinion of the majority in Canterbury and is a fair and just way of expressing that desire to all. Please vote YES to keep our property values high and keep the desirable aesthetics we all enjoy.


