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Oh! Christmas Tree

Christmas trees, bedazzled with tinsel, randomly decorated by families with children, or austere: just the few, well-chosen ornaments from trips abroad, are an integral part of the holidays. Though most closely associated with Christian households, millions of other families of different faiths have embraced this emblem of December. Usually an evergreen conifer such as spruce, pine, or fir, the Christmas tree, perhaps more than any other symbol, reflects the joy of the holidays.



Modern Christmas trees originated during the Renaissance in early modern Germany. Its 16th-century origins are sometimes associated with Protestant Christian reformer Martin Luther, who is said to have first added lighted candles to an evergreen tree. The Christmas tree was first recorded to be used by German Lutherans in the 16th century, with records indicating that a Christmas tree was placed in the Cathedral of Strasbourg in 1539. The earliest known firmly dated representation of a Christmas tree is on the keystone sculpture of a private

home in Alsace (then part of Germany, now France), with the date 1576.

According to the Encyclopaedia Britannica, "The use of evergreen trees, wreaths, and garlands to symbolize eternal life was a custom of the ancient Egyptians, Chinese, and Hebrews. Tree worship was common among the pagan Europeans and survived their conversion to Christianity in the Scandinavian customs of decorating the house and barn with evergreens at the New Year to scare away the devil and of setting up a tree for the birds during Christmas time."

So what kinds of trees are the best Christmas trees? Conifers, which as the name suggests, bear their seeds in cones, are usually the trees of choice. Conifers are ancient plants: there are conifer fossils as old as 300 million years. The most widely used conifers for Christmas trees are pine, spruce, and fir. Pine trees grow their needles in groups of two, three, or five (think *packet*); If a twig carries its needles singly, it is a fir or spruce. If you pull off a needle and it does not roll because it is *flat*, it's a fir.



Letter to the Editor: Say NO To Saint Philip Lutheran Church Cell Phone Tower!

Health Concerns:

- The International Agency for Research on Cancer (IARC) has classified radiofrequency electromagnetic fields as possibly carcinogenic to humans (Group 2B), a category used when causal association is considered credible, but when chance, bias or confounding cannot be ruled out with reasonable confidence.
- German Research on cell tower safety discovered that the proportion of newly developed cancer cases was three times higher for those living within 1300 feet (a quarter of a mile) of a cellular transmitter compared to those living further away. In addition, they found that the patients became ill with cancer on average 8 years earlier.
- American Cancer Society suggest there is no strong evidence that exposure to radiofrequency electromagnetic waves from cell phone towers causes any noticeable health effects. However, this does not mean that the radiofrequency electromagnetic waves from cell phone towers have been proven to be absolutely safe. Most expert organizations agree that more research is needed to help clarify this, especially for any possible long-term effects.

Cell phone towers are not properly researched and regulated, don't let them make you and your family a test subject!

Property Values Decrease Substantially:

- Environmental Health Trust research indicates that over 90% of home buyers and renters are less interested in properties near cell towers and would pay less for a property in close vicinity to cellular antennas. Documentation of a price drop up to 20% is found in multiple surveys and published articles.
- The US Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) long considers cell towers as "Hazards and Nuisances."

Property values will drop in our neighborhood up to 20%! This rezoning is also unnecessary as there is a large strip mall with plenty of empty space for a cell tower just west of this location (Pierce St. and Ken Caryl Ave.). This area would be more suitable for a tower, and it is not adjacent to private residences. Help your neighbors and voice your disapproval for this rezoning!

- The rezoning of St. Phillips Church is unnecessary as there is a large strip mall with space not adjacent to private residences. Strip mall off Piece Street and Ken Carlyn Avenue.

Outdoor Ice Skating Rinks

RINK AT BELMAR, LAKEWOOD

Admission (skate rental included): \$10 (\$8 for kids 12 and under; seniors and children two and under skate free) or \$6 if you bring your own skates. Park in the lot at Teller Street and West Virginia Avenue. Even in the daytime, the Rink at Belmar can get plenty of shade, so make sure you check the weather and bundle up. Extreme weather may close the rink, so check online or call ahead to make sure the rink is open as planned. Outdoor heaters and fire pits help friends or parents stay toasty.

SKATING IN THE SQUARE, ARVADA

Admission (skate rental included): \$10 (\$7 for kids 12 and under). Take the G Line to Olde Town Arvada, and you'll find a cozy little skating rink in the square on 57th Avenue, between the library and the pedestrian mall. Pick up your skates at the nearby shed and take to the (synthetic) ice.

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PARKER ICE TRAIL, PARKER

Admission: \$9 (\$7 for kids 10 and under). **Skate rental:** \$4. The ice circles a center grassy area and is fenced in on both the inside and outside, offering more space for beginners to hold on as they get accustomed to the ice. Located at the edge of downtown Parker in Discovery Park (behind the library), the ice trail offers concessions, skating aids for new skaters, and a handful of fire pits and seating for spectators to keep warm.

DOWNTOWN DENVER RINK, DENVER

Admission: Free. Skate rental: \$11 (\$9 for kids 12 and under; fourth graders skate free). The downtown rink sits in Skyline Park, in the shadow of the Daniels & Fisher clocktower between the 16th Street Mall and 17th on Arapahoe Street. Open late on holidays and weekends, the rink offers concessions and locker storage for your belongings. Fourth graders skate free, and double-bladed skates are available in children sizes.

EVERGREEN LAKE, EVERGREEN

Admission: \$14 (children four and under skate free); \$20 with skate rental included. Skate rental: \$10. Winning the prize for best views while skating, Evergreen Lake is open throughout the winter as weather permits. Learn to Skate classes are available for children, and athletes can sign up for hockey and broomball online. Regulars or families can purchase 10-punch skate cards for \$120 (\$30 savings). Park at Evergreen Lake House or take the shuttle from Stagecoach Park lower parking lot on weekends and holidays.

Homemade Candy Canes

These homemade candy canes are SO much better than store-bought, and so fun to make! Just make sure you have a stick of butter handy to keep your hands buttered for pulling so it doesn't stick to you.

Ingredients:

- 2 cups sugar
- 1/2 cup light corn syrup
- 1/2 cup water
- 1/4 tsp. cream of tartar
- 1 tsp. peppermint extract
- · 1 tsp. red food coloring

How To Make:

- In heavy-bottomed large saucepan or small pot, combine first 4 ingredients and stir until sugar dissolves. Cook, without stirring to hard-ball stage. (265 degrees.)
- 2. Remove from heat and add peppermint extract. Divide into 2 portions, and add coloring to one part. Pour out onto buttered cookie sheets. (Pour half onto one sheet, then add coloring to the rest and then pour onto second sheet.) when it's cool enough to handle, start pulling each part separately. (Best done with 2 people, but if doing alone, go back and forth pulling each.)
- 3. When you feel like you just can't pull anymore, form into ropes and twist them together. Cut into 8" lengths, form into the shape of candy canes, and place on lightly buttered platter til fully hardened.

Trail of Lights Chatfield Farms

Now – Jan. 1, various evenings, 5-8:30 p.m. (closed Dec. 25). Tucked into the foothills under the dark sky, the glow of lights can be seen for miles. Just under a mile of walking trail, the illumination of cottonwoods, boxelders and pine trees line the pathway through the Green Farm, Crossroads, Deer Creek Discovery Children's Play Area and 1880s Hildebrand Ranch homestead. - 1. Keep people food out of the reach of your pet, and ask your guests to do the same.
- 2. Make sure your pet doesn't have any access to treats, especially those containing chocolate, xylitol, grapes/raisins, onions or other toxic foods.
- 3. Don't leave your pet alone in the room with lit candles, a decorated tree or potpourri.
- 4. Keep holiday plants (especially holly, mistletoe and lillies) out of reach of pets.
- 5. Consider leaving the tinsel off your tree if you have a
- Secure your Christmas tree to keep it from falling over if your dog bumps it or your cat climbs it. Hanging lemon-scented car air fresheners in the tree may deter your cat from climbing it.
- 7. Provide a safe place for your pet to escape the excitement (such as a kennel, crate, perching place, scratching post shelf or hiding place) if you're entertaining guests. If your pet is excitable or scared, consider putting your pet in another room with some toys and a comfortable bed.


