Covenant Violation Updates:

- Potential violations are being monitored, with notifications sent for identified violations.
- Board voted unanimously to change the "cure" period from 30 days, the default time in the software, to 10 days for most stage 1 and stage 2 violations, to more closely align with the covenants (ex. trash containers, commercial and recreational vehicles); manual overrides to 30 days for others (ex. paint, roofing, landscaping)
- Board members encouraged to help monitor, adding any violations to SmartWebs.

COHOPE: Annual *Nights Out* scheduled – August 1st (not scheduled for our neighborhood this year due to low attendance in the past)

Jeffco creating 40-person task force to develop draft plan for short term rentals. Our covenants require minimum of 6-month rental period.

Parks and Roads Committees: No reports. Information will be provided in the Scroll.

Parks Beautification Day Redo a Success! As one said, "We're glad to help as it's only a couple of hours a year!"

Some serious fluffing of the Wayside Meadows Park playground was a huge focus and entailed sweeping up the wood chips by the shelter, evening up the chips under the play structures and swings, trimming tree suckers by the playground, cleaning out the dugout, and ever-so-fun weeding! Several young children seemed to delight in digging up dandelions while discovering new flowers. Other residents scraped up mud off the path by the creek, picked up trash by it and on the park's western side, and pruned the junipers at the entrance to West Laurel Park so the sidewalk could again be walked on by two people at once. We hope that Tom and Matthew's backs are none the worse for wear for placing 1,800 pounds of stones in the south Elmhurst and Pierce entrance. Since it was too swampy on June 17th to paint the bridges or shelters as planned, the Kern family, especially little Lilah, were excited to paint one or more later in June. Special thanks to Sarah McAfee from Foothills Park & Recreation District (FPRD) who came on her day off to provide great assistance and a truck's worth of tools. Thanks to all those unnamed residents who make it a habit of making a big difference in our parks throughout the year. If anyone's name was inadvertently omitted, please tell us so you can be recognized next month.

When neighborhood clean-up was canceled because of

When neighborhood clean-up was canceled because of the snow on Earth Day, Cub Scout Leader Ryan Stadler and his boys did a clean-up project instead at Clement Park while school was still in session. Thanks to you, too.

Wayside Meadows Park Updates: After numerous complaints/concerns raised by residents, FPRD staff shored up the westernmost bridge and tightened the planks. Feel free now to stomp on it all you like! Staff also fenced off the hole by the Wadsworth culvert and have been working on getting it filled in. After a resident was worried about trees interfering with power lines on S. Pierce St., FPRD hired a local tree contractor to remove the trees. FPRD staff were immediately notified of a small tree down across the sidewalk on Pierce south of Fairview.

Another homeowner told the Committee a man was using the park's paths as his own personal racetrack while riding his motorcycle for an extended period and at excessive speeds. She suggested more signs might be needed. FPRD was asked what could be done about this issue which sadly crops up every summer. The response: "It sure is frustrating when our parks and trails get used inappropriately. Unfortunately, this is not the only location it happens." Rule signs at both CKS/E parks state: "No Unauthorized Vehicles." FPRD staff "could litter the park with signs and that is no guarantee they will be adhered to. Regarding enforcement, FPRD staff have passed this information along to

their ranger to look out for this activity at Wayside." Residents of CKS/E are encouraged to report any criminal activity to the Jefferson County Sheriff's non-emergency line: 303-980-7300 or call 911 for an emergency.

After the mid-June rains, a resident questioned the amount of water in the retention pond between the King Soopers strip mall and the houses that back up to W. Clifton Ave by S. Upham St. The retention pond is doing exactly what it should—it looks like a regular pond but with a riser at a higher point to retain a permanent pool of water to control stormwater runoff.

Update about West Laurel Park Improvements: After

the revised bid was sent out to contractors in early June, FPRD staff began reviewing bids received from contractors. That was very promising as none were received in the first round. Stay tuned in this space for updates!

When FPRD maintenance staff has some extra time, they've been asked to remove the unsightly juniper stumps at the park's northwest corner on W. Laurel Ave. FPRD was asked to cut down the bushes last winter as they made it hazardous for people walking on the dangerously icy sidewalk in front.

Looking for something unusual this summer? Look for fantastic tree sculptures, including the owl and Yoda tree located at 7524 W. Laurel Ave. after the homeowner wanted to repurpose his diseased tree. It was carved by chainsaw master Bongo Love who was featured on Discovery Channel's *A Cut Above*. Love

is also the genius by the sports-themed tree at the Pierce St. entrance to Clement Park, the Blue Heron located at the park's Shelter N, and the owl tree at Dancing Willows Park.

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Traffic and Roads Report

Update on W. David Dr. crosswalk: I am thrilled to report that the very long anticipated safety improvements to the crossing on W. David Dr. between West Laurel Park and Wayside Meadows Park have finally been completed! Jeffco Transportation and Engineering Division staff were first contacted almost a year ago requesting a safer passage for pedestrians between both parks. After surveys, etc. were done, and then waiting for warmer weather, staff installed a crosswalk and four signs alerting drivers approaching eastbound and westbound to slow down because of the upcoming crosswalk. My sincere thanks to Jeffco staff for making our neighborhood safer. The HOA was also thanked "for bringing this high-crossing location to our attention."

Leaning signs: Thanks to HOA President Tracey Decker for noticing that a speed bump sign just north of W. Phillips Ave. and S. Upham St. was leaning so far away from the street and covered by a resident's vegetation, it was difficult to notice. Within a week, a new sign was installed and the homeowner(s) had cooperated by trimming their trees at the request of Jeffco Road and Bridge staff. KUDOS to both County staff and the homeowner for taking care of this safety issue so promptly!

A few days later, another damaged sign was also noticed on S. Upham St. just south of Chatfield. It, too, was obscured by heavy vegetation on a resident's fence. The County was again asked to repair/replace the sign and ask the resident(s) to cut back their vegetation so the sign can again be visible.

This is a reminder to all homeowners whose trees and bushes may be blocking signage or sidewalks – please see how you can make CKS/E safer for everyone. Thank you.

Since the beginning of the year, it was predicted that the first half of the year would be challenging with some uncertainty in the real estate market. As we close out the spring market, much of the market has failed to engage in normal spring behavior! It is predicted that we have inventory just waiting to enter the market. There appears to be some pent-up demand from sellers that need to sell but are happy with their current mortgage rate and not quite ready to list their homes. The lack of inventory of homes for sale has created a lack of active buyers. The buyers appear to be experiencing some fatigue and are waiting for the perfect home or to uncover a good deal and what they perceive as good value!

But there is good news! The number of new listings is starting to show that the second half of the year might be much more active. Active listings at the end of May are 13% higher than April. Under contract homes are up almost 3% and closings in May were up almost 7% from April! Average prices for all residential homes are up 2.7% from April!
