9 AUTUMN HEALTH AND HOME SAFETY TIPS FOR SENIORS

With autumn in full swing, don't miss this quick essential checklist for seniors looking to safeguard their health and safety this season. Article originally appeared on seniordirectory.com.

- 1. Get the Flu Vaccine: It is critical that everyone get the flu shot sooner rather than later. Seniors may also want to check with their doctor about a possible pneumonia vaccine.

- **4.** Check Batteries: Everyone who utilizes wood stoves, fireplaces, and space heaters, should check their carbon monoxide and smoke detector batteries this fall. Plan on testing the alarms on these detectors every month.
- **5. Protect Against Falls:** It's not just inclement icy weather that can put seniors at a higher risk for falling during cold weather months. Factors like increased joint pain or difficulty exercising because of cooler weather can also make seniors with chronic conditions more likely to experience a fall inside their home. Upgrade your living environment to guard against falls this autumn with easy-to-use tools like grab bars and non-slip bath mats, to name a few.

- **6. Make Sure You Can See:** Make sure you have gotten your annual vision checkup done so that you know you are seeing correctly or have the prescription aids to do so. Test the lighting throughout your home and replace bulbs that are dimming or simply aren't bright enough. And don't forget that clocks fall back an hour in early November which means that your evenings get quite a bit darker. You may want to plan outings and travel accordingly.
- 7. Plan for Solitude: Even with the holidays, the fall and winter months can still leave many seniors on their own, especially when freezing temperatures or bad weather make it difficult to get out and about. For seniors, autumn may be the perfect time to brush up on technology to maintain contact with the outside world and stay connected with friends and family. This may include using Skype or Facetime, or simply joining social media platforms like Facebook.
- **8. Prep for Bad Weather:** Are you ready for bad weather? In addition to coats, scarves, hats, gloves, and boots, you'll want to make sure that you have backup supplies of water, food, prescription medicines, and first aid items both in your home and in your car. Don't forget battery-operated and candles which will come in handy if your power is knocked out.
- 9. Plan for Murphy's Visit: You know Murphey (they guy with all those laws). What can go wrong will go wrong! And adverse snowy weather makes the unpredictable nature of weather even more chaotic. Get ahead of that chaos by planning for what you can. Make sure your snow tires are in shape for another season. Make sure the snowblower (or snow shovel) are in working order. And make sure those projects around the house get completed before the snow arrives. heavy snow and large tree branches (hanging hazardously over your car or roof) DON'T MIX!

INGREDIENTS

- ³/₄ c. all-purpose flour
- 2 T. yellow cornmeal
- 1 t. baking powder
- 1 t. cayenne powder
- 1 t. paprika
- Salt and Pepper to taste
- 2 med. roasted green peppers, chopped
- 2 ½ c. roasted corn (frozen works too)
- 2 large eggs
- ½ c. whole milk
- 1 T. vegetable oil

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. In a large bowl combine dry ingredients: flour, cornmeal, baking powder, cayenne, paprika, salt+pepper, chilis, & corn
- 2. Incorporate eggs, buttermilk, stir to combine
- 3. In a skillet over med-high, heat vegetable oil, and dose batter in 3-4" pancake-shaped blobs. Fry for 3-4 mins. Flip and cook for another 3-4 mins. Batter should be cook through.
- 4. Serve with green onions, sour cream, or chunky avocado salsa.

History of The Jack O'Lantern

Jack O'Lanterns were originally carved in turnips and potatoes as the tradition came from an old Irish Legend about a man making a deal with the devil and needing to ward him off. Some origins come from the Scottish Highlands where people were scaring off lost souls around All Saints Day, the day after Halloween.

As the tradition evolved and depending on what fruits and vegetables were around everything from beets to apples were used until the pumpkin became the official gourd.

It has now evolved from the traditional Jack O'Lantern face to scary pictures related to halloween or works of art. Make sure your pumpkins, or other fruits and veggies are carved and ready then proudly displayed in your works of art and scare off the wandering souls.



Leawood Metropolitan Recreation And Park District Meeting Minutes of September 13, 2023

The Leawood Metropolitan Recreation and Park District Board meeting was called to order at 6:13 p.m. by President Kyle Sargent. **Members present:** Judy Anderson/Vice President, Donna Snyder/ Treasurer, Myra Pasco and Maggie Tocco. **Other District:** Debby Baker/Secretary and Dave Padilla/Park Manager. **Visitor:** Leawood resident Karin Hall and Dutch Creek resident Craig Peterson.

Approval of Agenda – Maggie moved that the proposed agenda be approved. Judy seconded and the proposed agenda was approved without objection.

Approval of Minutes – Judy moved that the minutes of August 10, 2023, be approved. Maggie seconded and the minutes were approved without objection.

Public Comments – None

Conversation with Park District Management Company – Peggy Dowswell with Pinnacle Consulting Group presented her company and answered Board questions.

Treasurer's Report – Donna presented the Treasurer's Report. Bills to be paid this month include Weston, Waste Management, Xcel Energy, Denver Water, Doggie Walk Bags, Honey Bucket, Dave's invoice, and reimbursement to petty cash. Judy moved that the Treasurer's Report be received, and bills paid. Maggie seconded and the motion passed unanimously.

Parks Manager Report – All parks were mowed, irrigation inspected, doggie bags checked and replenished as needed.

(A) Leawood Park: Concrete damage near porta potty repaired. Repair of fence damage should be completed in October. Tree trimming completed. Fertilizer and weed control applied.

- **(B)** Weaver Park: The removal of the volleyball court will begin in September. Fertilizer and weed control applied. Bushes trimmed along the path near soccer field. Mulch added to planters around the pavilion and at park entrance.
- **(C) Raccoon Hollar**: Large tree branch down, will be removed by Urban Drainage. The major tree trimming project will be revisited with Weston to determine scope and price.
- **(D) T Track**: Fertilizer and weed control applied.

OLD BUSINESS

- **(A) Update of 2023 projects:** Postponed until next meeting due to time constraints.
- (B) Recruitment for the Board, Assistant Park Manager:
- (1) Karin Hall attended the meeting to observe. She is considering joining the Board as a position opens. She and her husband have lived in Leawood for 35 years.
- (2) Dave and Kyle spoke with residents James Dawe and Rick Olsen. They expressed interest in the assistant park manager position. Kyle noted that the interest indicated has been varied in terms of availability and longer-term commitment, and that the board will have to figure out if anyone who expressed interest might be a fit in the short-term or if the board looks at other strategies.
- **(C) Record/file storage, retention:** Postponed until next meeting due to time constraints
- (D) Vintage Overlook Proposed Development: Donna received a notice from Jefferson County Planning and Zoning. Kyle will investigate the one notice that appears to include the Vintage Outlook.

NEW BUSINESS

- (A) Special District Management Companies: Board is researching special districts management companies as a possibility for the future.
- (B) Discussion of 2024 Budget The Board continued to discuss the future of the District, including the expected increases in costs - both short and long-term - to relieve the treasurer's role of day-to-day accounting and to reduce that of the parks manager. Considerations that have been discussed include the hiring of a district management company and increasing the responsibilities of the landscape company. Factors in any decisions include the possible need for a mill levy increase to cover the additional costs and whether there is enough community support beyond just increased tax revenue. Options range from making adjustments to current operations to provide short-term relief to merging or discontinuing the district altogether.

Future Board Meetings: The next Board meeting will be Wednesday, October 11, 2023, 6:00 p.m. at Leawood Elementary.

Adjournment: The meeting was adjourned at 7:53 p.m.
