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- Our governing document CCR's are 38 years old, outdated, and are obsolete due to so many new Colorado laws? It requires 2/3rds of the homeowners to vote "YES" to amend them. TownSq will be utilized to help increase homeowner participation and hopefully amend our CCR's in the future.
- It has been over a decade since the annual meeting has met quorum.
   Meeting quorum requires 10% (56 homes) of the homeowners for an annual meeting.
- The typical HOA assessment in the US is \$200-300 a month https://www.rubyhome.com/
- The WGMHOA Pool is free to all homeowners that are current on their assessments and have no violations. If you were to go to the Ridge Recreation Center, it would cost you \$15 each time for your family. You can enjoy our community pool for free!
- Pickleball, tennis, and a basketball court are free for homeowners as well!
- It would cost each homeowner \$28 per month to have one trash and recycle bin from Republic Services? The HOA assessment covers your trash for much less!!!
- The Reserve Study from April of 2019 is outdated and underfunded. The Board is in the process of having an updated Reserve Study prepared to guide future budgeting needs.

#### August Gardening Calendar

As gardeners, we enter a slower, more easy-going phase in the garden process. There's always something to do in the garden but we don't need to keep up the frenetic pace of planting-mulching-weeding that April and May demand. June's blooms may have faded, but with proper pruning some may make a reappearance in



August. July's heat is over and there's still a lot of summer left.

In August harvesting our gardening efforts has begun, but we can take time to do it right, even enjoy the process. If we pay attention, August presents a wisdom not available any other time of year. The garden is maturing now. We can see our mistakes, our successes, and the intrusions on our efforts that nature presents on her own. In August there's time to look around and appreciate the garden...and then get back to work.

#### MAJOR CHORES FOR AUGUST

#### **Vegetables:**

- Plant spinach and lettuce mid-month for a fall harvest.
- Harvest cucumbers intended for slicing when they are 6 to 8 inches.
- Onions are ready to harvest when their green tops fall over. Lift the bulbs and brush off loose soil. Bring them to a protected area like a porch or covered shed. Lay them out in a single layer on a surface that permits ventilation top and bottom. When the outer skins have turned papery place them in a mesh bag or old panty hose and place them in a dark and cool place.

#### Peppers can be harvested anytime they achieve the size you need or want.

- Water tomatoes regularly until late August. After that, fruit will ripen more quickly when water is withheld.
- After harvesting and areas become empty sow cover crops, like annual rye grass, often called green manure, to build garden soil.

#### Lawn:

- Begin lawn renovation and repair. Build up low areas with garden soil and over-seed areas that are thin or bare.
- Attack persistent weeds like bindweed with a 2, 4-D product. But the ultimate goal is to grow a thick healthy turf that will choke out weeds.

#### Garden:

- Newly planted perennials, trees and shrubs need consistent watering to get established.
- Fertilize roses for the last time around August 15th. Fertilizing later may stimulate new succulent growth that could damage the plant if there is an early frost.
- Divide spring blooming perennials if needed. Ways to tell if a perennial needs to be divided is if the plant has a 'hole' in the middle and doesn't look as attractive as it used to, if blooms decrease or stop altogether or if the plant is crowding out neighboring plants.

Take advantage of plant sales. Usually starting mid-to-late-August and into September many nurseries will have plants sales with prices as much as 50% off.

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
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
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### Water Safety Tips

- DO learn to swim. If you like to have a good time doing water activities, being a strong swimmer is a must.
- DO take a friend along. Even though you may be a good swimmer, you never know when you may need help. Having friends around is safer and just more fun!
- DO know your limits. Watch out for the "too's" too tired, too cold, too far from safety, too much sun, too much hard activity.
- DO swim in supervised (watched) areas only, and follow all signs and warnings.
- DO wear a life jacket when boating, jet skiing, water skiing, rafting, or fishing.
- DO stay alert to currents. They can change quickly! If you get caught in a strong current, don't fight it. Swim parallel to the shore until you have passed through it. Near piers, jetties (lines of big rocks), small dams, and





docks, the current gets unpredictable and could knock you around. If you find it hard to move around, head to shore. Learn to recognize and watch for dangerous waves and signs of rip currents - water that is a weird color, really choppy, foamy, or filled with pieces of stuff

- DO keep an eye on the weather. If you spot bad weather (dark clouds, lighting), pack up and take the fun inside.
- DON'T mess around in the water. Pushing or dunking your friends can get easily out of hand.
- DON'T dive into shallow water. If you don't know how deep the water is, don't dive.
- DON'T float where you can't swim. Keep checking to see if the water is too deep, or if you are too far away from the shore or the poolside.

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#### **HOA Reserve Fund**

An HOA reserve fund is money set aside by a homeowner's association for additions to major components the association is obligated to maintain and future replacements and repairs that don't occur on an annual basis. The recommended contribution per the Reserve Study

has not been budgeted in previous years. Maintenance has been deferred in the past, adding to the cost of neglected repairs.

#### Completed/Anticipated 2023/2024 Reserve Fund Projects

- Hidden Park grey breeze path installed Jan. 2023
- Bathroom mold mitigation at the Cabana Feb. 2023
- Bathroom remodel of men's & women's showers/toilets at the Cabana – May 2023
- Monument walls removed never permitted and in vision triangle – May 2023
- Digitize 25 boxes of homeowner files to eliminate storage and to readily access information – July 2023
- New monument entrance wall built to county codes and permitted – expected Aug. 2023
- New Reserve Study Aug. 2023
- Rock replenishment along S. Simms & around cabana expected Aug. 2023
- Cabana crawl space mold mitigation, reinforce joists, install vapor barrier and cross vent/fans – expected Sept. 2023
- Cabana heating modification and maintenance expected Sept. 2023
- Cabana parking lot resurface expected 2023/2024
- Repaint fencing around pool/tennis courts expected 2023-2024

### **Assessments/Fees/Fines**

This is a final reminder for homeowners who pay their assessments by check. Homeowners must have their bank update the mailing address if they haven't already done so. Associa can't reverse late fees if this hasn't been done. If you have not updated the mailing address yet, your payments will have been returned to your bank account. The old lockbox has been closed since January 2023. You need to be sending payments to:

If you have been using bill pay from your individual bank account or sending a check to the lockbox and wish to enroll in Direct Debit, please download the form from TownSq or submit a "Request" to find out more details. It's much easier and there is no fee associated with the assessment if you take advantage of Direct Debit.

Direct debit only pulls regular monthly assessments, it doesn't pull for violation letter fees and fines. Violation letter fees and fines must be paid separately to avoid late fees and interest. Please send a check for fees and fines to the same address above.
