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### Notes From The April Board Meeting Happy Spring to all!

Within a few weeks, the countdown to summer will begin and children will have visions of no homework in their heads. The pool has been fully serviced and we believe it is finally in full repair for many years to come. Over the last decade, we have replaced the pool surface, pump, pump motor, water heater and chemical



regulation controls, and while extremely expensive and arduous, the 30-year pool maintenance items should finally be complete.

We've collected enough Simms St. fence repair quotes to approve a contractor and get those repairs completed in the coming weeks. As expected, it took an unusual amount of time to find fencing contractors who were willing to entertain repair services, as so many fence replacements were needed throughout the front range from the wind in early April. The large spruce tree next to the East pool fence has also been fully removed after its demise in the windstorm. We are consulting with Bailey Tree to entertain a replacement, but will likely need to wait at least a year to allow for the remaining roots to die off and allow the soil to accept another mature tree.

As usual, the work and coordination of the

Woodbourne Easter Egg Hunt committee resulted in a hugely fun and successful hunt for all who participated. We look forward to other events this summer season – pool kickoff party, 4th of July parade, and the Wave-sponsored end of summer event. We are continuing to evaluate how we align possible sponsors to events to help keep Woodbourne-specific costs to a minimum.

The Clubhouse renovation phase 1 construction has either just been completed or will be completed as you are reading this note. The next step is to purchase furniture and other items to fill the space. Simon and his committee have gone above and beyond catering to schedule changes, vendor replacements and everything else that goes into a project, as all-consuming as this one has become. Their efforts are greatly appreciated!

Unfortunately, the HOA Annual meeting did not take place on April 16th. We were only able to attract 71 representatives from the neighborhood either by signed proxies or physical attendance, well below the 102 residents required for a quorum. The discussions we did still entertain covered many aspects of resident life: the fiber optic companies installing product, Chatfield students (and unfortunately some residents) speeding throughout our Woodbourne streets, and the possibility of resurfacing the tennis court. The Board is not required to conduct another in-person annual meeting, and since a re-print notice would be required and would cost over \$750, this is being viewed as unnecessary. There is also no assurance that we would attract the quorum of 102 attendees to conduct the meeting again, and

# Memorial Day Activities With Kids \_

We're so excited for the summer! The pools are opening, the grill's heating up, and school's winding down. But in the midst of the fun, take a few minutes to teach your family that Memorial Day is a special time to recognize the service men and women who've fought for our country.

#### Explain the History of Memorial Day


The Memorial Day tradition began around the Civil War, when folks wanted to honor the soldiers who had died in that conflict by decorating their graves. There's some disagreement over whether this started in the south or in Waterloo,



NY, but in either case, the tradition started as Decoration Day. Families would gather together at cemeteries, bringing picnics and remembering, together, those whom they had lost. Gradually Decoration Day became Memorial Day, and in 1971, Memorial Day became a national holiday to be celebrated on the last Monday of May. While Memorial Day is specifically a holiday to recognize the sacrifices of men and women who have died in combat, many people also spend the day honoring veterans and current service personnel and working for peace and unity with all people.

#### Watch a Parade or Memorial Service

We have some local parades, and kids love a parade, but you can also take the opportunity to point out traditions and Memorial Day etiquette. Teach children that we stand and

take off hats as veterans pass in a parade. Have them look for American flags, and point out that, officially, flags are to be flown at half-staff until noon on Memorial Day as a remembrance. During services you may also see soldiers fire rifles into the air or people throwing flowers into the ocean in memory of those lost at sea. Next time you're at your local town hall or playground, check for a memorial and take time to read it with your kids.

#### Make a Tasty Treat

Bring cookies or another treat to our neighbor, a World War II veteran. It's wonderful to recognize someone your kids know. But it's also fun to enjoy a treat yourselves! A simple one is a blueberry and strawberry parfait with yogurt, whipped cream, or ice cream. Put them into clear plastic containers to show the patriotic colors, and pop them into the freezer if it's a hot day.

#### **Craft Something Special**

Want to slide in a history lesson while keeping little hands busy? You can help kids make a tissue paper poppy while explaining about Memorial Day's origins, then explain that poppies, because they are blood-red, became a symbol of sacrifice during World War I. These are easy to create, and they make a lovely gift.

### Red, White, And Blue Trifle

When you're looking for festive Memorial Day desserts or just an easy summer treat, turn to this red, white, and blue trifle to satisfy your sweet tooth. The key to this patriotic trifle is using fresh, ripe berries. Skip the frozen fruit here.

YIELDS: 8 - 10 serving(s); TOTAL TIME: 30 mins **Ingredients:** 

- 8 oz. cream cheese, at room temperature
- Two 6 oz. containers blueberries (about 2 cups)
- 1/2 c. granulated sugar
  Two 6 oz. containers
  1/2 c. heavy gram
  blackbarrieg (shurt 2)
- 1 1/2 c. heavy cream
- 1 tsp. vanilla extract1 lb. pound cake, cubed
  - One 1/2 qt. strawberries, stems removed, sliced

#### Directions

stems removed, sliced

blackberries (about 2 1/2 cups)

1. Combine the cream cheese and granulated sugar in the bowl of a stand mixer with a paddle attachment. Beat on medium-high speed for 1 to 2 minutes until smooth. Scrape the sides and bottom of the bowl. With the mixer on medium, slowly add the heavy cream and vanilla and mix until combined. Switch to the whisk attachment and whip at medium speed until soft peaks form and the mixture is easy to dollop.

2. Place a single layer of cake cubes in a large trifle dish (about 12 to 14 cups). Top with 2/3 of the blueberries and blackberries, then 1/2 of the whipped cream (about 2 cups), then 2/3 of the strawberries. Repeat the cake and cream layers once more, then decorate the top with the remaining berries. Serve immediately or make in advance and store for up to 24 hours in the refrigerator.

### **Etiquette For Dog Parents**

Dog parents have a responsibility to manage their pets' behavior and follow certain rules of etiquette. Follow these guidelines to ensure that you and your dog are being courteous community members.

- Scoop your poop. Bring several bags on your walks to be sure you have enough. If you run out, either come back and clean it up later, or ask another walker if they have a bag to spare.
- **Prevent barking.** Practice getting your dog's attention to easily redirect him if he barks at people or other dogs. If you know your dog acts this way, only allow him in the yard when supervised.
- Only let your dog greet a stranger if they ask. The same rule applies if you see another dog and caretaker approaching. Ask first and respect the other's response.
- Always leash your dog on walks. Not everyone is comfortable around dogs. Keep your dog close to you and stay alert to others. Your leash should be short enough to prevent your dog from contacting or jumping on passersby.
- **Don't play while on leash.** If you meet another dog on a walk (and it's alright with their caretaker) let the dogs sniff each other for five seconds and move on. Letting your dog play with another dog while on leash can result in injury and teach your dog that all dogs enjoy this kind of interaction, although many don't.
- Be aware of other people's feelings. If your dog does something to upset someone (jumping up, barking) apologize to them and take measures to prevent the situation from reoccurring.



# **Help Protect Loved Ones From Scams**

*In part from the Jeffco Sheriff's Behind the Badge Newsletter* Our victims of scams are not numbers, however; they're real people. People like Susan, who was victimized and whose name we have changed to tell her story.

Susan, 76, got a call from a man claiming to work for an Internet provider. He told her that while he was checking her Internet speed, he noticed she had a \$500 credit on her account for services she was entitled to but did not use. He instructed her to get on her computer and when she did, a page was already open that she did not recall opening. The caller told Susan she had accidentally hit a button that selected a refund of \$5,000 instead of \$500. The caller then told Susan he would lose his job if he didn't get the extra \$4,500 back.

The caller instructed Susan to withdraw \$4,500 from her bank and purchase nine \$500 gift cards. He stayed on the phone with Susan while she went to the bank and two separate stores to purchase the gifts cards. During the call, Susan asked

him several times if he was scamming her. He said no. Once she had the gift cards, the caller instructed her to tell him the gift card numbers and security codes. Susan did. After the call ended, Susan tried calling his phone number back but the number was disconnected.

Unfortunately Susan was scammed for \$4,500.00. Could the same happen to your parents? Your grandparents? Even you? Scams come in many forms, but how we should respond to them is the same:


- Do not answer calls from unknown numbers. If it's important, they'll leave a message.
- Do not provide personal information on the phone or in an email or text message to anyone you do not know. Personal information includes date of birth, social security number, credit card numbers, and bank account information.
- Do not withdraw money, send money, purchase gift cards, or make other financial transactions for someone you do not know.
- If you suspect it's a scam, end all communication hang up the phone or delete the email or text message.
- If you have been scammed or your personal information has been used without your knowledge or permission (for example, a new credit card arrives in your name),

report it to local law enforcement immediately (and cancel the card!).
