Notes From The August Board Meeting

Happy September – Smell that? It's almost Fall and soon the pumpkin spice will be everywhere. As you read this, we are actively closing the pool for the season and fixing the leak from the wader pool. We'll also be assessing our pool furniture as we prepare our 2024 budget. We do not foresee any issues this off-season, so opening the pool on time is our primary goal.

Our August Board meeting was short and sweet. We discussed the recently passed Colorado HOA statute HB23-1105 relating to landscaping and the newly formed State HOA Taskforce. If anyone has any questions regarding the contents of that bill, please do a Google search. There are many relevant items that home-

owners should be aware of for next year. We are also working with Altitude Law on updating our internal policy documents to align to these new requirements.

As a reminder we have taken up a new clubhouse renovation subcommittee to look at all things clubhouse, landscaping, and future improvements. There are many great ideas, and the next step will be to prioritize projects based on feasibility and communicate next steps to homeowners. The initial projects will revolve around updating the aesthetics and function of the clubhouse. The small fireplace and false wall will most likely be the first item addressed, along with new flooring and removing the wall that divides the main room into the kitchen. In parallel we will be looking at the reserve study to (hopefully) address the aged restrooms and add elements to get them up



Palisade Fruits and Produce

Colorado peaches are most famously grown in the town of Palisade, and they are known for being extra juicy and extra sweet, thanks to the long sunny days and cool summer nights in Colorado, which help all those delicious fruity sugars develop. Palisade peaches have a long history as a Colorado classic, and it all starts with a man named John Harlow. After the Ute tribe were



forcibly removed from their ancestral home in the Western Slope in 1881, colonizers began developing a town known as Palisade. The farmers there quickly realized just how rich and nutrient-filled the soil was, but while it was great for vegetables and grains, there wasn't nearly enough rainfall or water for fruit trees, which shriveled up and died very quickly. But John Harlow, who planted some of the area's earliest peach trees with his wife in 1882, was a determined man. He spearheaded a canal project to divert water from the Colorado River and irrigate the region, and though it took years for his project to come to fruition (pun intended!), it worked. By the beginning of the 20th century, more than twenty-five thousand pounds of peaches were being shipped from Palisade to regions across the country each year.

Once they figured out irrigation, farmers began planting more fruits, like apples, pears, grapes, apricots, and cherries, cementing Palisade and the surrounding area as Colorado's most famous and most productive agricultural hub. Today, Palisade is home to orchards, farms, and vineyards galore.

The Best Homemade Applesauce

After tasting the pure apple flavor of this homemade sauce, you just might never go back to the store-bought kind. Supermarket applesauce can be loaded with added sweeteners and flavorings. We use only a little sugar, plus lemon juice, salt and cinnamon, providing a balanced flavor and the perfect amount of sweetness.

Ingredients:

- 4 lbs assorted apples, (Golden Delicious, Honeycrisp, Gala or McIntosh about 8), peeled, cored & chopped
- 1/4 cup sugar
- Kosher salt
- 1 tablespoon freshly squeezed lemon juice
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon

Directions:

Combine the apples, sugar, 1 cup water and 1/2 teaspoon salt in a large pot. Bring to a simmer over medium-high heat, stirring occasionally. Reduce the heat to medium-low. Cover with a tight-fitting lid and cook until the apples are very soft, 18 to 20 minutes.

Stir in the lemon juice and cinnamon. Let cool for 5 minutes or so, then transfer the apple mixture to a blender, filling no more than halfway. Remove the center cap from the lid and place it on the blender. Cover the lid with a folded kitchen towel to catch splatters and pulse until smooth. Alternatively, puree in the pan with an immersion blender.

Transfer the applesauce to a bowl and refrigerate until cool, about 1 hour. Store leftover applesauce in an airtight container in the refrigerator for up to 5 days.
